Mobile Phone Ban Implementation

We are advised that a suite of materials to support the implementation of this ban will be rolled out to schools this week. We acknowledge the schools that are ahead of the game in this matter and encourage all schools to adopt the practices that best suit their community. There are valid reasons for exemptions for some students and some classes. There are also very valid reasons for the ban.



Funding to support hard to staff school and challenging schools



We note that there are 200 x \$50,000 grants available to schools to lure staff to hard to staff, challenging schools which replicates the offers to support Rural and Regional schools with huge cash incentives. There will be a process to demonstrate their need for these grants in an application and we understand that the advertising of the position which attracts this incentive will be very apparent. This may cause people to delay

their staffing process until later than desirable in term 4 causing considerable stress to PCEs. We urge DET to get this process underway ASAP and determine the school and positions to be so tagged rapidly.

40 Executive Principals for the States most difficult schools

To date the process to determine the remuneration for Executive Principals has been less than fair and far from transparent. This is a great initiative which we support with 2 provisos. Firstly, that these individuals are paid appropriately and the process to determine the remuneration is fair; Secondly, that they are supported to quickly remove difficult and underperforming staff. The APF is very happy to assist with the salary negotiations for these positions on behalf of members. Please do not sign a contract and then ask the APF for assistance, as it is too late at that point.



Excessive workload

The APF continues to negotiate with the DET for ways to reduce the workload of PCEs. We expect to have an announcement on this soon.

Blog 11 – APF Community Service Study Tour of Vietnam



So we all gathered at Melbourne airport, 14 principals, one partner, 4 tour guides and one APF President. What could go wrong? Well not a lot to be honest, we had a great time and took back some amazing experiences, new friendships and many ideas for our schools. From learning about the perils of human trafficking at Blue Dragon to the sights of Ha Long Bay this was an incredible journey for us all.

We travelled with Antipodeans who specialise in student travel to countries like Nepal, Cambodia, Vietnam and many more. The team gave us an inspiring insight into how student travel can inspire students to make a difference in remote communities and change in our own lives. The Antipodean philosophy is based around ethical travel and teaching the values of resilience, mindfulness and leadership. Any school looking to run an overseas learning experience could do worse than having a chat with Antipodeans.



Top 5 - What did we learn

1. Human Trafficking is real and we need to do something! We spent an amazing morning with the Blue Dragon team to see how they are rescuing and supporting victims of Human Trafficking. We heard from members of the team and the work they are completing along with meeting some of the kids who served us morning tea. There were some heart breaking stories that will remain with us for a long time.



2. One small group of students can make a difference! We visited regional communities in the Mai Chau province and saw first hand the difference Australian Students had made to families in the region. Travelling groups fund-raise, plan and work with local tradesmen to build new kitchens and bathrooms. We visited a group of Western Australian students who had moved 1800 bricks in the morning in readiness for building the walls of the kitchen they were helping build during their stay. No mean feat in 35 degrees and high humidity.



3. Do your Risk Management! Some of the groups who travel with Antipodeans trek in and out of the villages they are working in. Imagine trekking 15km, working for 4 days and trekking out, that would take some planning. We learnt about real life examples of what could go wrong and how this is managed. We trekked for about 8km in extreme heat and humidity, we were glad we had done some training.

2. The food. We were treated to banquets and buffets till our eye balls popped out. Many of the team will be doing an extra gym class or two this week.

3. Hanoi. We spent three nights in Hanoi and got to enjoy the local culture from Aerobics by the lake in the morning to the night markets, there is always something going on in this city.

4. Ha Long Bay. The plastic bag affair aside, this is one of the most beautiful places you could ever visit and we recommend having a night



on Athena cruises if you like the finer things in life.

5. The laughs on the bus. President Julie was probably an easy target the first few days, but gave as good as she got. Once we all settled and relationships formed there was a lot of fun to be had.

6. This was everything the trip promised to be. A great learning experience, a look at opportunities for student travel and a many new friendships formed. 'A Dong of Principals' have never had such a good time.
